Family Activity: Snags, Limbs and Logs

A Family Activity for All Ages

As you explore Duke Farms you will discover a number of dead limbs, dead trees (snags) and logs around the property. Why do we leave them there? There is life in these dead trees! Many animal residents of Duke Farms call dead trees home. These landscape features are important parts of habitats. One estimate suggests up to 2/3 of all species rely on dead wood at some point in their lifetimes.

Procedure: Today you are going to go on a dead tree hike! Take a look around as you explore Duke Farms. Rent an Eco-Kit* to look high up into dead trees and on dead limbs to see what you can find. Illustrate some of your discoveries in the boxes below. See if you can use the binoculars and field guide in the Eco-Kit to identify what animals are using the dead trees as a home.
